A SALES EXPERIENCE

Before the end of the fall semester, Dr. David Ferrell (CC '75) assigned Sales Class students to a selling experience with insurance professionals in McPherson to engage them in the real life situation of having to 1) make a phone call to someone they don't know, 2) set up the appointment, 3) arrive on the appointed date and time (early); 4) dress appropriately, 5) make eye contact, shake hands (no bone crushing handshakes and no fishy handshakes); 6) find common ground; 7) make small talk; 8) give the presentation on the CCKK insurance program; 9) show confidence and product knowledge; 10) talk clearly and not mumble; 11) answer questions thoughtfully and accurately; 12) take control of the situation; 13) bring the conversation to a close; 14) thank them and exit in an appropriate way.

After the presentation, when Dr. Ferrell called the insurance professionals for feedback, every student represented themselves, the department, the College, and their families in very positive ways. Comments included: "She should get an A for her presentation." "You have some great students at the College." "I wish I had this opportunity at their age." "You have a good

program there." "This is an invaluable opportunity for your students." "Thank you for calling me to participate." Dr Ferrell stated, "Probably not a single student wanted to complete this activity. They had some fear and uncertainty. One student considered dropping the class because of this assignment. But every student, in the end, was glad for the opportunity to experience this in real life. They now have the confidence that they can make that appointment, they can show up (if appropriately prepared) and execute the presentation, and feel assured that they can do this again."

Student Kassidy Forsberg loved the experience, saying, "This experience was new and invigorating. It provided me with future skills and competencies that I can use for the rest of my life. It was interesting to promote an insurance course to a professional in the area of insurance. I learned that even when selling to somebody, the client is still just a person with knowledge, feelings, and uniqueness. The second thing I learned is I am not afraid to present information face-to-face with others as much as I used to be. Lastly, I found that following up with the client and readiness are key factors that

build business relationships. Overall, I acquired more knowledge about the insurance programs when I had to promote them in my meeting with Todd Whitehill".

Student Jordan Meier stated, "The experience was very nerve-racking at first. I was afraid that I would mess up my presentation, but once I got in there and started talking to her I immediately calmed down. She was so nice and was interested in what I had to say. This experience was very helpful for me when I get in the career field".

After six months of serving the city of McPherson as Interim Police Chief, Mikel Golden has accepted the position of McPherson Police Chief.

Mayor Tom Brown made a motion to drop the interim in Golden's title and officially acknowledge him as the designated leader of the McPherson Police department. The move was unanimously received and voted in as official.

Surrounded by his wife and daughters, Golden was pinned with his new badge declaring him "Chief."

Former Chief McClarty worked with Golden throughout his years in the department and it was at his encouragement that Golden be appointed Interim Police Chief while the city considered the next appointment for the position.

The City Commissioners said they believe the city has a bright future with Chief Mikel Golden and Assistant Chief Todd Martens at the helm of our 34 persons Police Department.

Chief Golden is a 2015 graduate of Central's organizational leadership and criminal justice bachelors programs.

A FAMILY CHRISTMAS



Twas the night of Central's Family Christmas. Great crowds of students, faculty, and staff gathered together in the cafeteria for a communal Christmas celebration full of laughter and stress relief.

The end of the semester arrived quickly, and so did final exams. The Student Government Association (SGA), led by Student Body President Marleigh Strickling, sponsors "Exam Crams" at the end of every semester. Typically, Exam Crams happen at 9 pm on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of finals week to provide opportunities for students to take a break from studying and get their minds off of finals for a little while. The end goal is for students to feel refreshed by engaging in activities with other students, faculty, or staff.

Dean of Student Life, John Walker, brought the idea of providing Christmas gifts for every student as a surprise at the end of the semester to SGA at the end of October. In order to provide gifts for every student, parents of students would be sent a letter asking them to send in a gift for their child, which would then be handed out to each student. SGA loved the idea and decided to run with it.

Soon thereafter, the Central community was made aware of an Exam Cram event that would take place on Monday, December 9th at 9 pm. The traditional Exam Cram event on a Monday night of finals week was Late Night Breakfast—an event where hot breakfast items were served by faculty and staff to the student body late at night. However, this semester SGA desired to

couple this traditional event with the new idea of providing Christmas gifts to each student.

SGA sent out letters to parents immediately and packages started arriving as soon as the second week of November. The vision of making this event spectacular for the students inspired additional ideas. The SGA team chose a well-known favorite, chicken and waffles, to be served for the Late Night Breakfast portion of the event, and in an attempt to foster the Christmas spirit they convinced Santa Claus to make an appearance despite it being his busiest time of the year. SGA wanted to sponsor an Apple Watch giveaway as well. Multiple packages began arriving every day, and by Thanksgiving break, SGA had received many gifts from parents for their child (some even sent extras for other students!). SGA even received gifts from community members.

About a week before the event, SGA realized a lot of gifts were still needed and that parents would not be able to send in gifts that late. Faculty and staff were contacted asking for help—to pick specific students they would enjoy giving a gift to and bring those gifts wrapped and ready to hand out.

Within 24 hours every student was accounted for. It truly was amazing to see the generosity of faculty and staff and it was an incredible blessing to the SGA team.

The night of the event approached quickly. The last gifts were being collected, SGA was setting up the cafeteria where the event would be held, the Apple Watch was being wrapped, faculty and staff were gathering to serve breakfast, and students were waiting in great anticipation. They began lining up outside the cafeteria doors to get some delicious breakfast and learn how they could win the Apple Watch. What they still didn't know was that they each would receive a Christmas present that night. Santa Claus showed up just in time, the chicken and waffles were golden brown, and all the gifts were set out around the stage and under the tree. It was time for the doors to open and for Central Family Christmas to begin.

Students were greeted and invited to take part of the Christmas celebration by faculty and staff as classic Christmas music filled the air. Santa Claus sat atop the stage with the gifts all around him as several other faculty and staff served students going through the breakfast line. Not only were the chicken and waffles a huge hit, but the bacon and eggs were too! Creative Dining Services did a wonderful job that was crucial to the night's success. SGA had planned to wait until all students had gone through the line before starting to hand out gifts to students, but there was no end in sight to the line as tables began to fill up one by one. TIGERS TAKE ON FALCONS

On December 13, 2019, the Lady Tigers Basketball Team got to come home after a 3 week stretch of away games. They have been busy competing against NCAA Division 1 & 2 teams to help prepare for their conference play this season. For this home game, however, the Tigers took on the Kansas Christian College Falcons and looked to get back in the win column before the next conference game on the 16th of December.

The Tigers would assert their dominance quickly in this game. In addition to getting off to a quick start offensively, they would also show off their dominate defense only allowing 6 points for the visiting Falcons. The Tigers would take advantage of their strength in numbers as they would tire down the Falcon's defense and score easy baskets. They would also cause a lot of turnovers and take advantage of their speed and transition play. At half the Tigers would find themselves with a comfortable 40-12 lead.

The next half would almost be identical to the first as the Tigers would find ways to cause the Falcons to commit turnovers and then would go down the floor and score. The Tigers also had one of their better shooting days as they shot over 45% and would make 9-24 beyond the arc. Four Tigers would even score in the double digits. At the end of regulation they would take home a dominating victory with the score Tigers: 91 and Falcons: 30.

The Lady Tigers improved to 3-5 and are looking forward to the heat of the season coming up in the first quarter of 2020.

The choir will be performing Dan Forrest's Requiem for the Living in New York City, in combination with many other choirs from around the country. Previously members of the CCCK Concert Choir sang at Carnegie Hall in November of 2017, under the direction of Mr. Joseph Martin, where they performed Martin's debut of Rhapsody in Bluegrass.

Dr. Vogel served at Tabor College for twenty-one years as Professor of Choral Music and Music Department Chair. His Concert Choir has been selected to perform at the Kansas Music Educators Association State Convention five times, and he has been a guest conductor with the Wichita State University Symphony Orchestra and A Cappella Choir.
