Dr. Larry Anderson serves with the conference superintendent in giving pastoral oversight and preaches regularly at St. Barnabas Free Methodist Church. This church plant is on the campus of Central and ministers to both McPherson community members and students. This also serves as an occasional outlet for ministry majors to have preaching opportunities. The department also hosts the annual Chaney Bible Lecture in the spring semester. The student will create and present an original interpretation of a scriptural text. (Analyze and Communication and Creative Work). Students used their biblical grounding to prepare an original interpretation (analyze; creative work) and present it to the class (communication). 3. The student will evaluate ministry performance on the basis of theological categories. Students prepare a detailed Case Study as outlined by the industry standard book Shared Wisdom: A Guide to Case Study Reflection in Ministry based on their internship experience. Students are trained in giving structured feedback in the process reflective of the Shared Wisdom model (analyze, adaptation).
